## Digital support for remote learning

Dear parents,

A fab week in school with our regular skipping workshops able to take place (under strict COVID guidance) on Thursday; and a brilliant day for Pelicans on Wednesday when the children took on the role of teacher: Mrs Foley dressed in school uniform and each child (who wanted to) led a session of their choice. This was an outcome of their reward system which is outlined below:

#### Pelican's Class reward system Rationale

Our reward system is based on developing the children's understanding of a market economy; encouraging leadership and working collaboratively.

Children are awarded whizzes for positive learning behaviours and adherence to school rules. If they reach the top of the whizz chart (5 whizzes over the course of a day) they receive a star coin.

Star coins can be spent on rewards in the reward shop. The rewards have been invented by the children and regularly change. If a reward becomes popular, it increases in price just like in a market economy reflecting supply and demand. Others may fall in price to encourage children to have a go at new things.

The rewards reflect a range of interests and learning preferences by the children. Examples include: 30 minutes free time for the class Lead the class in an activity of your choice Kids take over day (anyone who wants to, can teach a lesson through the day) Pyjama day Art day French day By regularly reviewing the rewards on offer, including the children in decision making and altering the prices, children remain engaged and motivated by it. The rewards also allow the children to choose to reward just themselves or the entire class and more often than not they chose the latter.

As well as doing dodgeball, hockey and cricket, they also shared their skills in football & gymnastics



Everyone had a great day. One of the children's feedback answers to 'What did you enjoy the most?' was 'When everyone was teaching and they took good control of the class'. The overall feedback conclusion for the day seemed to be that the hardest thing about being a teacher is 'getting people to listen'.
